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Manuel FUSTES, a mechanical engineer, graduated from the University of Houston with a specialty in transportation. Currently he is an independent systems consultant in Intelligent Traffic System (ITS) and Electronic Tolling Collection (ETC) systems. His consultancies have included projects in the United States and other countries worldwide: Australia, New Zealand, Malaysia, Philippines, South Africa, South America (Chile, Argentina) and Europe (Spain, Portugal, Ireland and the UK), among others. These consultancies required him to travel for extended periods of time and consider in depth and detail problems associated with transportation, energy, and climate change. His experience in the transportation industry has allowed him to interface with various private enterprises and governments at local and national levels. His consultancies have assisted governments and agencies to develop workable solutions that can be properly and sensitively implemented in response to the particular cultures these governments and agencies represent.

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David LEMPert is a Ph.D. social anthropologist, lawyer, and MBA who has worked in more than 30 countries on five continents, focusing on collapse, violence, change processes, cultural survival and sustainable development. He is one of the pioneers in the study of collapse and political change with his neo-Malthusian model of Mauritius in the early 1980s and was the first American anthropologist to study the urban Soviet Union during the perestroika period. His textbook on sustainable development planning, *A Model Development Plan*, published in 1995, is believed to be the first in the field.

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
